

Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: This gospel calls us to hospitality; it is about receiving others and thereby receiving Christ. But this hospitality goes beyond what we usually mean

by the word. It is not about throwing parties or offering a bed when it will make us look good or give us fodder for our social media feeds. It's not a hospitality of convenience. This is rather a hospitality of the heart; it is about being willing to move around our very selves in order to make space for others. That's why Jesus' words about receiving others and offering cups of cold water are paired with those about taking up our crosses and losing our lives. This hospitality is about giving of ourselves, which is sometimes uncomfortable. But Jesus is calling us to something deeper here. We do not give up our lives for no reason, but because in doing so we imitate the self-giving love of God. By making this space for others, we find our truest selves.

To Experience: Many of us are adept at surface-level hospitality; we know how to greet someone new, to make conversation, to be friendly. Many of us know how to open our homes to others, to create a pleasant experience and tend to the immediate needs of those who eat or sleep under our roofs. But Jesus asks us for something more; hospitality of the heart requires deeper vulnerability, radical generosity, and profound trust in God.

- 1. What do you usually mean by hospitality, and how do you practice it in your life? How might these readings challenge you to expand its practice?
- We are sometimes hesitant to think of the rewards God promises—we want to do the right thing simply because it is right—but these reading make clear that there is a reward for those who receive Christ in others. What reward do you hope for? What hopes are you hesitant to bring even to God?
- 3. How could your parish's liturgy become an experience of the radical hospitality to which Jesus calls us in this gospel?

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Prayer is essential for our lives as Christians. Just as the body will soon wither and die without food, water and air, prayer is necessary for the life of the soul. Without prayer, the soul will undergo a spiritual death.

I enjoy talking about different projects and dreams that I have for both parishes. But there is only one project that really matters. One day when I am standing before the judgment seat of God, He will not be asking me about boilers or budgets, or painting projects. He will be asking me if I brought people to life in Christ. We need to take care of the other projects, but the only "project" that has eternal significance is our relationship with Jesus Christ.

My main job as pastor is to be an example of prayer, to pray with others, and to teach others to pray.

Prayer is difficult. Our culture values activity. Taking time for prayer feels like a waste of time. But prayer is necessary before any of our activities are fruitful. Historically, it would be hard to find two saints that had a larger impact on the church and in fact on world history as St. Dominic and St. Francis of Assisi. They labored tirelessly in their preaching and service to the poor. Yet, before either one of them sent anyone out on mission, they first founded convents devoted to ceaseless prayer.

In more recent times, we can look at the amazing example of St. Teresa of Calcutta, known affectionately as Mother Theresa and her Missionaries of Charity. They work tirelessly for the poorest of the poor. Each day throughout the world tens of thousands of people are fed at their soup kitchens, sheltered in their homes, and find medical care in their free clinics. Mother Theresa knew that this truly impressive effort of compassionate care was only possible if it was supported by prayer. When her Missionaries of Charity were invited to begin a new ministry in a new area, she insisted that they first establish a convent completely devoted to prayer.

She was firmly convicted that without prayer all her efforts would come to naught.

Prayer is never a waste of time. It is simply entrusting that time to God the Father. He knows us better than we know ourselves. He loves us more deeply than we could possibly imagine. He knows what we need, even before we ask for it. All the time that we spend with God in prayer is fruitful, not because of our own effort, but because God makes it fruitful.

Take time to pray. It is never wasted.

If there was one thing you could communicate to the faithful about the importance and role of the Eucharist in our Catholic faith, what would it be? The one thing that I would communicate to the faithful is that the Eucharist is really Jesus. He is really and truly present in the little host. Let's unpack that ... As human persons we are made for relationship. From the very moment of our existence, we are in relationship, namely with our parents. We have families, and we make friends. These relationships make us who we are. We were created by God for relationship and, in particular, for friendship with him. It is not easy to be in friendship with someone if you cannot be with them. So, God sent his Son to become man so that we could be better friends with him. We read about the friends Jesus made in the Gospels:

Peter, James, John, Mary Magdalene, and many more. After Jesus died and rose for his friends (us!), he left us his real presence; he left us the Eucharist. He gave us himself and his presence in the Eucharist. Jesus desires nothing more than to be in relationship with us. He wants to fulfill our longing for authentic relationship, and he knows that is difficult to achieve without real presence. So, he gave us his presence in the Eucharist. At every Mass, we can become closer to Jesus than almost any other person in our lives. We can receive him into ourselves. This unique relationship with Jesus in the Eucharist can transform our lives.

Which saint should people invoke for your vocation and why? Please invoke St. John Marie Vianney for my vocation because he is the patron saint of diocesan priests. His intercession will be powerful for me as I receive the sacrament of holy orders.

Tenth annual 'Walk to Mary' covers 21 miles

CHAMPION — A priest's appeal in 2011 to begin a walking pilgrimage in northeast Wisconsin, similar to other pilgrimages to holy sites around the world, inspired two men to take up the challenge.

On May 4, 2013, the first "Walk to Mary" took place. About 350 people participated in the 21-mile pilgrimage from the National Shrine of St. Joseph in De Pere to the National Shrine of Our Lady of Champion in Champion, some 18 miles northeast of Green Bay.

This year, the 10th Walk to Mary was held May 6 and attracted 5,330 people from 44 states as well as Canada and Mexico.

After a 7 a.m. prayer service and blessing, pilgrims departed on their journey along the Fox River Trail under overcast skies and drizzling rain.

By noon, the rain stopped and lunch was served at Holy Cross Church in Bay Settlement, the 14-mile mark. Pilgrims began arriving in Champion around 3 p.m. Bishop David Ricken was on hand at the shrine to wel-

come pilgrims and celebrated Mass for them at 5:15 p.m.

The walk's founders look back with awe on the event's success and how it has achieved one of its goals: bringing people closer to Mary.

"It has been inspiring to see how it has grown, not only attracting people from all across the U.S., but impacting those who participate," said Pat Deprey, who, along with Tom Schmit, answered the call for a walking pilgrimage made by Fr. Francis (Rocky) Hoffman, executive director of Relevant Radio.

FRANKLY, FRANCIS



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In our continuing catechesis on apostolic zeal, we turn to St. Francis Xavier, patron of Catholic missions. Born in Spain, Francis studied in Paris, where he met St. Ignatius of Loyola. Together with a few companions, they formed the Society of Jesus, placing themselves at the service of the pope for the urgent needs of the church.

The 16th century, the age of discovery, called for a great missionary outreach. Francis set out for the East Indies. Starting in Goa, he carried out intense activity of preaching, baptizing, catechizing and caring for the sick. From India, he passed to the Maluku islands and to Japan. Unable to fulfil his dream of entering China, Francis died, at only 46, on the nearby island of Shangchuan. His heroic zeal for evangelization was the fruit of a life of deep prayer and loving union with the person of Jesus Christ.

May the example of St. Francis Xavier inspire our own efforts to advance the Church's mission, as joyful witnesses to the risen Lord and his saving word.

Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." We are so blessed to be before our Lord in the Eucharist at the Mass. Adoration gives us another opportunity to be with our Lord in an intimate and close way. Besides formal Adoration, we can also spend time in prayer before the tabernacle of our churches. ...
