

Thoughts for Today's Readings


To the Point: Like last week, this gospel tells the account of one of the Rosary's Luminous Mysteries. The Transfiguration is a mysterious episode. It seems

hard to describe—Jesus' clothes became white, but whiter than you're thinking, Mark seems to say. The whiteness is bright enough to dazzle; there seems to be some kind of light here. There is also darkness; a cloud comes and casts a shadow over the disciples on the mountain. Not much is clear about what this is or what it means. But one thing is clear: the voice from the cloud that says "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Following Christ does not always make life easy or clarify our decisions, but when we rest in what the disciples heard on that mountain, we can be assured that it is the right thing to do.

To Experience: Our own encounters with God are rarely as remarkable as the transfiguration. We are more likely to hear God's voice in a whisper than with the clarity the disciples heard on the mountain. But God's voice, whether whispering or thundering, always speaks love. God is always trying to get through to us that we are wildly, unreservedly loved. God looks on us, and God loves us, and God is well pleased in us.

- 1. Where and how do you see God in your life? This could be an extraordinary moment of revelation or a series of ordinary occurrences; God is present in both.
- 2. Where do you find God hard to see? How could this be an invitation to further seek God?
- 3. Peter says, "Rabbi, it is good that we are here!" When in your life might you say the same thing? Where do you encounter God in a way that makes you want to linger in God's presence?

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As we have looked at the practice of "lectio divina," how has God's Word spoken to you?

When we are prayerfully attentive to God's Word, we hear Him truly speaking to our heart. This cannot be a hurried reading. This cannot be a distracted reading. This is also not the way a scholar would read the Word. It is the way that the Spirit guides us in reading.

As we have read God's Word attentively and prayerfully, our mind and our heart should have been drawn to particular words or phrases from scripture. As we ponder these words, we are naturally led into meditation.

Now as we meditate on scripture, we get to a point where we can meditate no longer. At this point, have we exhausted what God can tell us through His Word? NO! The longer we apply our heart to "lectio divina," the more we discover that His Word is an ever-flowing font of wisdom that nourishes the soul. One cannot exhaust the depths of God's Word. When we come to the point where we can meditate no longer, it's not a shortcoming of God's Word, but rather a shortcoming of our ability to pray.

At this point, our work of prayer is not finished. Now it is time for the third step of "lectio divina," that is ORATIO. ORATIO is the Latin word for "prayer." This can be confusing, since all of "lectio divina" is a prayer, so how is this step different? In the first step, "lectio" that is reading, God is speaking to us through His Word. In the second step, "meditatio," we enter into our "inner room" to ponder. Now with ORATIO, we RESPOND to God's Word, and enter into a conversation with the Lord about His Word.

How has the Word comforted you? Share that with the Lord in your own words. How has the Word challenged you? Share that with the Lord in your own words. Ask the Lord for the graces you need to rise to these challenges. Has the Word of God moved you to action? Make a resolution to act on His Word. Speak to the Lord from your heart.

The last step of "lectio divina" is "contemplatio." "Contemplatio" means to simply rest in the Lord's Word. Think about a couple who has been married for years. After a while they often grow quiet in each other's presence. But even without words, they have lived together and loved each other for so long that they can share a conversation of love through their silence. "Contemplatio" is this same prayerful resting in God's Word. Since

"contemplatio" requires the least action on our part, it can feel like we aren't doing anything. However, in prayer "not doing anything" is not a waste of time. Rather, it is time that we let the Word of God soak into the depths of our heart, and let God's Word do something in us. "Contemplatio" is giving time to God to act in our heart.

The Significance of Lenten Colors

The color purple holds significant symbolism throughout the Lenten season. It recalls the robe that Pontius Pilate placed on Jesus before His crucifixion, serving as a reminder of Christ's suffering and sacrifice. Purple is also traditionally associated with royalty, signifying Jesus as our eternal King.


On Palm Sunday, the color red is prominently featured in the vestments worn by priests. This foreshadows Jesus' death on the cross, emphasizing the solemnity and sacrifice of his journey. Red is also the color worn on Good Friday, further emphasizing the profound significance of the crucifixion.

In contrast the color white takes center stage on Holy Thursday and Easter Sunday. White represents joy and purity, symbolizing the triumph of Jesus' resurrection and the new life sound in him. It serves as a visual reminder of the hope and rejoicing that accompany these significant days.

The colors used during Lent enhance the spiritual experience, evoking emotions and providing visual reminders of the central themes of Jesus' suffering, sacrifice, and ultimate triumph over death.



Mass for the Families of the Parish

Have you noticed a Mass being offered for your family, but you don't know who scheduled it? Masses can be offered for the benefit of any person living or dead, or for any intention, as long as it is not contrary to the teachings of the Church. Sunday Masses are by far the most popular dates that people request for Mass intention. Since the law only allows one stipend per Mass*, Mass intentions for Sundays usually fill up fairly quickly. However, Mass intentions for weekday Masses often remain open. The practice in both parishes is that when there is an open Mass intention, the families of the parishes are scheduled for the intention. In this way, the parish administrator can offer Mass for the spiritual benefit of every family in the parish. Since these intentions are scheduled by the parish office, you are not required to pay the customary Mass stipend, nor are you required to attend the Mass.
