

Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: The anger and suspicion Jesus displays in this gospel are hard to reconcile with the Jesus we usually see in the gospel. Jesus usually en-

counters sinners with patience, calling them to conversion by offering them an encounter with God's unfailing love. But this episode reminds us that he is fully human. He is not a one-dimensional character; he is not limited to whichever characteristics resonate for us. He experiences the full range of human emotion, including anger. While this emotion can lead many of us to sin, this gospel passage makes it clear that the anger itself is not a sin. Jesus himself experienced even forceful anger. But this was anger in the face of evil, and it is channeled productivity to restore sanctity to the temple. Jesus gives us a model even for how to be angry, and is with us whenever our anger at sin drives us to make the world a better place.

To Experience: The merchants and money changers that Jesus drives from the temple probably did not think they were doing any-thing wrong. They were providing a service for those who came to worship, making the required materials available. But their work was becoming a distraction, taking over space that should have belonged only to God. This can remind us that many things in our life that are inherently harmless can become problematic when they are prioritized in an unhealthy way. Whenever something takes up space in our heart that ought to belong to God, it is time to work on detaching from it, perhaps even driving it out for a time so that we can reset our priorities.

- 1. What makes you angry? How do you react to anger? How could you invite Jesus to accompany you in your anger?
- 2. How does the angry Jesus of today's gospel make you feel? If there is any discomfort, how could that help you broaden your understanding of God?
- 3. Which of the church's moral teachings are a struggle for you? How might you see them as an invitation to grow closer to God?

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Peace be with you. The next Five Alive practice that we will look at is the Sacrament of Reconciliation, also called the Sacrament of Penance or Confession.

Before we look at an explanation of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we will look at how our parishes will be offering this sacrament during the season of Lent.

Confessions will continue to be offered at the usual times. On Saturdays, starting at 3:00pm at St. Gregory. On Sunday, starting at 7:30am and again starting at 6:30pm at Holy Trinity. Additional times for Confession will be offered on Monday evenings of March from 4:00 to 7:00pm. During that time there will be the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, so anyone can come and pray during that time. You can come at any point during those times. You do not need to be there at the beginning. The priests will stay until 7:00pm, even if no one is waiting in line.

> March 4 and March 18 will be at Holy Trinity. March 11 and March 25 will be at St. Gregory.

We did a similar approach during Advent. And it worked really well. In fact, the second time Confession was offered, it was a steady stream of penitents for the entire three hours. Wow! Lots of Mercy was given that evening. A difference for Lent will be that extra priests will be available on March 11, March 18 and March 25, so the lines should move faster, and you will have the opportunity to go to Confession to someone besides your pastor.

Very few people will consider Confession to be their favorite sacrament. However, this sacrament of Mercy is a powerhouse of parish renewal. The most vibrant parishes in the diocese have a vibrant appreciation of this sacrament.

4. Confession







The sacrament of reconciliation contains the elements of conversion, confession and celebration. It is this sacrament which changes us, challenges us and equips us as disciples of our Lord, Jesus Christ, to reach out to others and transform the world for Christ. St. John Paul II says in "Novo Millennio Ineunte," paragraph 37, that "it is this face of Christ that must be rediscovered through the Sacrament of Penance."

The sacrament of reconciliation brings us into intimate contact with Jesus where we are liberated from the sins that trouble our hearts and minds and experience God's unconditional forgiveness and mercy so that we can be a living fountain of forgiveness and mercy to others. When this liberation happens through the sacrament of reconciliation, we are better disposed to proclaim the Gospel with both words and deeds.

renewed approach to the sacrament of А reconciliation should be encouraged in the parish with an explicit invitation to those who regularly attend confession, those who attend sporadically and those who do not attend at all. Spend time reflecting on the reasons why people may not come to confession. They may not have a personal relationship with Christ or a sense of sin, they may need more catechesis regarding the sacrament, they may be fearful because they have not been in many years, they may have had a bad experience in the past or the times that confession is available may be limited and not convenient. Like going to Mass, we can find strength and grow deeper in faith through participation in the sacrament of penance and reconciliation.


Confession urges us to turn back to God, express our sorrow for falling short and open our lives to the power of God's healing grace. This sacrament forgives the injuries of the past and provides strength for the future. If you have not been in some time, please do not be afraid. The Lord is waiting for you in the sacrament of reconciliation. All Catholics are obligated to go once a year, and Advent and Lent are particularly important times to go to confession. If you go a couple of times a year, consider going more frequently.

Mass for the Families of the Parish

Have you noticed a Mass being offered for your family, but you don't know who scheduled it? Masses can be offered for the benefit of any person living or dead, or for any intention, as long as it is not contrary to the

teachings of the Church. Sunday Masses are by far the most popular dates that people request for Mass intention. Since the law only allows one stipend per Mass*, Mass intentions for Sundays usually fill up fairly quickly. However, Mass intentions for weekday Masses often remain open. The practice in both parishes is that when there is an open Mass intention, the families of the parishes are scheduled for the intention. In this way, the parish administrator can offer Mass for the spiritual benefit of every family in the parish. Since these intentions are scheduled by the parish office, you are not required to pay the customary Mass stipend, nor are you required to attend the Mass.




