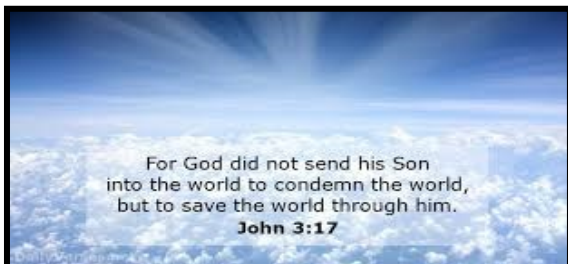
Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: We may feel tempted to distance ourselves from the people whom Jesus refers when he talks to Nicodemus. Surely we would choose light over darkness, given the choice. But think about the experience of emerging from darkness into light—when we are not accustomed to it, the light is painful and blinding. A more gradual approach might help, but Jesus does not promise to progress us to holiness only insofar as we are comfortable. Jesus only is what he is, and he is light—pure and radiant. This light can seem blinding at first, confusing us as we strive to turn more fully toward a life of faith. But as our eyes grow used to its brilliance, it enables us to travel farther and faster than we ever could without it.

To Experience: We do not always seek God as we should; we sometimes choose darkness over light. But God never stops seeking us. God is always calling us with love, trying to get into our hearts in a way that will keep us close. Our Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are intended to make room for God. With the clarity that comes from these practices, we can more readily choose to live in the light of God.

1. The gospel speaks of God's great enduring love, a love that gives God's only Son. How do you experience this love?
2. Even though God is light, God does not abandon us to the darkness. What is a time you felt God's presence through a dark time?
3. What do you need to detach from in your life in order to make more room for God to work?

LAETARE SUNDAY

"Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her.
Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult
and be satisfied at her consoling breast."
Is 66:10-11

Our opening Entrance Antiphon for Mass on this Fourth Sunday in Lent is where the theme for Laetare Sunday comes from. Laetare is a Latin word meaning *rejoice*. We celebrate Laetare Sunday midway through our Lenten season with 21 days left until Easter.

On Laetare Sunday, the Church takes a breather from the penitential Lenten practices. It's a day where the clergy put away the purple vestments which signify penance and put on rose-colored vestments. (A nice way of saying pink.) The color rose symbolizes joy for the Church.

There are several traditions that go along with Laetare Sunday. The wearing of rose-colored vestments goes back to an ancient tradition of the Pope carrying a golden rose when he left Mass. The golden rose was part of a cluster of golden roses that the pope would bless and then have distributed to Catholic heads of state, churches, and shrines as a symbol of outstanding service to the Church. Normally, during the Season of Lent, there are no flowers on the Altar or in the Sanctuary, but it is permitted to decorate with flowers, preferably with roses, on this Sunday of joy.

A tradition that started in ancient times and still continues is that Catechumens on this day are given a sacred copy of the Apostles Creed, signifying they would soon come into full communion with the Church on the Easter Vigil. On the Easter Vigil, as we know, catechumens receive Baptism, the Eucharist, and Confirmation, making them full members in the Church. This is a time for rejoicing among the Church.

Other traditions practiced on Laetare Sunday begin with visiting one's Mother Church, the parish where you were baptized. In some parts of the world, Laetare Sunday is also known as *Mothering Sunday*. Adult children make it a point to visit their mothers and plant a rose bush. They have a family brunch or dinner and decorate the table with roses.

However we celebrate Laetare Sunday, we should take a break from the somber mood of Lent. Today is a day to reflect on the joy of Easter to come, before we face the darkness of Good Friday and Holy Saturday. It is also a good day to reflect on our Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving and to take some silent time to let God speak to us and tell us what we need to change in our practices to make this a truly blessed Lent.

As we celebrate Laetare Sunday, let us keep our eye on the prize and not lose focus of the joy of Christ's Resurrection. Let us link our sufferings to Christ's suffering on the Cross for us, and let us remember we are an Easter people. Rejoice!

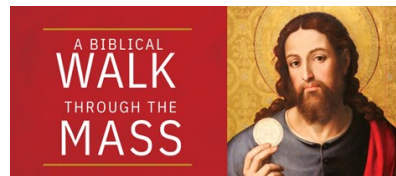

Holy Trinity Tabernacle Project

If you have been to Holy Trinity Parish, you will notice the usual tabernacle has been replaced by a small temporary tabernacle.

According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) and the Code of Canon Law (CIC) a tabernacle must “be immovable, be made of solid and inviolable material, and be locked in such way that that danger of profanation is prevented to the greatest extent possible.” The tabernacle at Holy Trinity is beautiful, its size is proportional to the church, it gives adequate prominence to the presence of Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament, and also has the strong sentimental value since it was constructed by a parishioner. However, it was moveable, and unfortunately wood, although beautiful, is not usually considered to be an inviolable material. In addition, there has been increasing reports of Catholic churches being vandalized and thefts of the Most Blessed Sacrament throughout the country.

In response to these concerns, the tabernacle was temporarily removed by DeWitt’s Church Goods in Green Bay, so that we could have craftsmen assess if it could be made more secure. The good news is that a metal tabernacle can be inserted into the current tabernacle. This of course does come at a cost, and the estimate from DeWitt’s is that this work will cost \$6,835.00. This is no small amount, but it is well below the price of buying a new tabernacle. To buy a brand-new tabernacle that would be both the right size for the parish, and be a truly worthy place to reserve the Eucharist, would run the range of \$12,000.00 to \$15,000.00.

So, this project, would secure the tabernacle as required by the GIRM and CIC, would preserve the contribution of time, labor and talent of one of our parishioners, maintain the look of the current sanctuary, and even be a cost savings compared to buying new. The cost is still significant. However, in the parish accounts there has been an accumulation of memorial donations that have not been spent for a significant time. Memorial donations should be used to cover projects such as the tabernacle project. So, the money is available to pay for this project. It will not have a negative impact on the operating budget, nor will it have to tap into emergency or contingency reserves.

This project will be discussed at the next pastoral council meeting, so any concerns or questions can be address to any member of the pastoral council or myself.

Laetare Sunday: The Fourth Sunday of Lent

A Joyful Term. Laetare is a Latin term for joy, rejoicing, or gladness. The Entrance Antiphon sets the mood. It begins, “Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all you who were mourning; exalt” (see Is 66:10).

A Joyful Break. Lent is a somber, penitential season. It is unpleasant to spend forty days concentrating on our sinfulness. As we examine our consciences, it is sad and humbling to count the number of sins that we have committed. The process can be demoralizing. Laetare Sunday is supposed to be a bright and happy occasion, a one-day breather, not dwelling so much upon our sinfulness but upon the joyful promise of God’s mercy.



Joyful Progress. Laetare Sunday is the Fourth Sunday of Lent, roughly the midpoint of the season. Three and a half weeks are completed and only three weeks remain. This means that our Lenten disciplines, the fasting, abstinence, self-denial, and other rigors are over half completed, and that the end of our self-mortification is in sight.

A Joyful Outlook. It is uplifting to know that Easter Sunday is only three weeks from today.

A Joyful Exception. “During Lent, it is not permitted to decorate the altar with flowers” (Roman Missal, 70), but Laetare Sunday is an exception to this rule. On that day “the altar may be decorated with flowers” (Roman Missal, 106); the liturgical color is violet, but the color rose may be used; and the music typically is more subdued, but the use of instruments and more upbeat melodies is appropriate.

Joyful Orations. The Collect begins with the joyful news that the human race is reconciled to God, and it mentions the “solemn celebrations to come,” the joyous celebration of the Triduum, the Institution of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday, salvation and redemption on Good Friday, and the Resurrection on Easter, all reasons for joy. The Prayer over the Offerings states, “We place before you with joy these offerings which bring about an eternal remedy,” everlasting life in heaven with God. The Communion Antiphon repeats the joyful theme, “You must rejoice, my son, for your brother was dead and has come to life” (Lk 15:32). The Prayer after Communion makes the joyful observation that God enlightens everyone who comes into this world.
