
Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: Jesus speaks in paradox here, reminding us that God is in the business of transcending boundaries and surpassing our expectations. He also reminds us that he is in the midst of transforming death. No more will it be a final end for humans. After Jesus completes the work of the crucifixion and resurrection, death is rather a moment of transition. It is a part of life rather than its end. Jesus himself is also a paradox here. He is, of course, troubled by the thought of dying. All humans are; it is not the fate for which God made us. But he accepts his impending death as the purpose for which he came to earth, and in his calm acknowledgment of this shows himself as something more than human as well. He is both fully human and

To Experience: In today's world, few of us will be called to die a martyr's death. But this gospel reminds us that our lives are not really ours. We are called to give over our lives in service to others. These sacrifices unite us to Christ and his suffering and death, enabling us to share also in his resurrection and life with God.

- How do you experience God's renewing work? How do you need God to make your heart new this Lent?
- How are you called to "lose your life" in order to follow Jesus? What sacrifices do you make and how do you find life within them?
- How might God be inviting you to take part in God's ongoing work of giving and sustaining life?

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I concluded my column two weeks ago with the observation that vibrant parishes have a healthy appreciation of the sacrament of reconciliation. This observation makes sense. Sin kills the life of grace, and without grace there is no spiritual life.

The most common objection to the sacrament of reconciliation is the assertion that one can confess directly to God.

Since we are biblical Christians, where do we find that assertion in the Bible?

The Apostle James makes it clear, "Confess to one another..." (James 5:16).

Throughout the Bible, in both the Old and New Testaments, God shows a strong preference to work through the cooperation of human mediators. God could have directly acted to free the Israelites from slavery in Egypt, yet God chose to work through Moses and Aaron. God could have chosen by divine decree to simply remit the sins of humanity, but he chose to send His Son into the world, "Incarnate by the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary," to suffer and die in the flesh for our redemption. God could have chosen to directly inspire the words of the Gospel into the hearts of all men and women, but He chose to send the Apostles to every corner of the world to preach that the Kingdom of God was at hand.

From the first verses of Genesis through the last verse of Revelation, God shows an unwavering preference to work through human agency and through human cooperation. He does not want to simply impose redemption from above. He does not want us to be merely passive spectators in the drama of our own salvation. He elevates our dignity by calling us to cooperate with His saving actions.

In the age of the church, that is from Pentecost until now (and really until the Second Coming), our cooperation with God's saving actions is expressed through the sacraments. At the beginning of life, one cannot baptize himself. At the hour of death, one cannot anoint oneself. At both birth and death, God mediates His grace through a sacrament. Why would it be any different in those moments when we have offended Him by our sins and have need of His mercy?

The Fascinating Story Behind the Rarest of Liturgical Devices: **The Crotalus**

Does your parish use the crotalus during Lent? The what? Here's an explanation.

Throughout the season of Lent, parishes have the option of using the crotalus as a replacement for the bells during the liturgy. The Church's liturgical rubrics don't prescribe a replacement for altar bells, but there is a long-standing tradition of using a wooden clapper or noise-maker in its place. This serves to mark the same events as the altar bells, but in a less "sweet" way, and thus, maintain the somber tone.

According to Catholic Encyclopedia and the old Latin Rite. the Church did not ring the altar bells "from the end of the 'Gloria in excelsis' on Maundy Thursday to the beginning of the 'Gloria in excelsis' on Holy Saturday. During this interval the Memoriale Rituum (Tit. iv, sec. 4, n. 7) prescribed that the clapper (crotalus) be used to give the signal for the Angelus, but it is nowhere prescribed in the liturgical functions."

However, this changed post-Vatican II. We now ring the altar bells beginning on Holy Thursday.

The term "crotalus" is a Latin term that comes from the Greek word "krotalon" (κροταλον), which means "rattle." Crotali can come in many different designs.

The crotalus was universally used, but fell out of use in the last few decades. It seems, however, to have made a little bit of a comeback due to an increase of interest in traditional liturgy.



Why do we cover statues and images with a veil during Lent?

The last two weeks in the season of Lent are called Passiontide which begins on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. This is when the Church shifts her focus from Christ in the desert (the Gospel for the First Sunday

of Lent) to Christ during His Passion.

During this period of Passiontide, you may have noticed in your parish that the crucifix and other statues and images around the church have been veiled with a purple cloth.

In the Roman Missal we find the instruction, "In the Dioceses of the United States, the practice of covering crosses and images throughout the church from [the fifth] Sunday [of Lent] may be observed. Crosses remain covered until the end of the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil."


The practice of veiling images alerts us that something is different, it can be startling at first, but the last two weeks of Lent are a time of immediate preparation for the celebration of the Sacred Triduum. The veils are hard to miss and they serve as a reminder to get ready!

The veiled images build within us a longing for Easter Sunday. The veils seem out of place, and even counterintuitive. It can seem strange that the crucifix is covered up during Passiontide. Through this absence of images, our senses are heightened and we become more aware of what is missing. Similarly, the suppression of the Alleluia during Lent effectively demonstrates that we are in exile from our true Home, where the angels sing Alleluia without ceasing.

When images are unveiled before the Easter Vigil, we are reminded that we, in a sense, live in a veiled world. It is through our own death that we are able to see our true home, and the veil is lifted. Christ lifts the veil through His Resurrection.

Holy Trinity Tabernacle Project

If you have been to Holy Trinity Parish, you will notice the usual tabernacle has been replaced by a small temporary tabernacle.

According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) and the Code of Canon Law (CIC) a tabernacle must "be immovable, be made of solid and inviolable material, and be locked in such away that that danger of profanation is prevented to the greatest extent possible." The tabernacle at Holy Trinity is beautiful, its size is proportional to the church, it gives adequate prominence to the presence of Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament, and also has the strong sentimental value since it was constructed by a parishioner. However, it was moveable, and unfortunately wood, although beautiful, is not usually considered to be an inviolable material. In addition, there has been increasing reports of Catholic churches being vandalized and thefts of the Most Blessed Sacrament throughout the country.

In response to these concerns, the tabernacle was temporarily removed by DeWitt's Church Goods in Green Bay, so that we could have craftsmen assess if it could be made more secure. The good news is that a metal tabernacle can be inserted into the current tabernacle. This of course does come at a cost, and the estimate from DeWitt's is that this work will cost \$6,835.00. This is no small amount, but it is well below the price of buying a new tabernacle. To buy a brand-new tabernacle that would be both the right size for the parish, and be a truly worthy place to reserve the Eucharist, would run the range of \$12,000.00 to \$15,000.00.

So, this project, would secure the tabernacle as required by the GIRM and CIC, would preserve the contribution of time, labor and talent of one of our parishioners, maintain the look of the current sanctuary, and even be a cost savings compared to buying new. The cost is still significant. However, in the parish accounts there has been an accumulation of memorial donations that have not been spent for a significant time. Memorial donations should be used to cover projects such as the tabernacle project. So, the money is available to pay for this project. It will not have a negative impact on the operating budget, nor will it have to tap into emergency or contingency reserves.

This project will be discussed at the next pastoral council meeting, so any concerns or questions can be address to any member of the pastoral council or myself.
